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USING SPIRITUAL FUEL

Because I wanted everything to be perfect for my Senior Prom, I borrowed my brother's car. I washed it, waxed it, and filled it with gas. Nonetheless, on the night when I needed it the most, it stalled several times and thus contributed to a disastrous evening. I later discovered the problem: the gas. Although I expected peak performance out of the car, I had failed to fill it with the right substance.

Likewise, the full performance of God's will requires that we use the right type of fuel; such fuel comes from focusing on heavenly matters, not earthly pleasures.

Romans 12:2 states that in order to prove what the will of God is, we must be transformed by the renewing of our minds. In other words, if we are to live as Christians, we need to let our minds dwell on the right things. Put simply, as Christians, we are what we think. This concept should not be hard to grasp. If a football player watches television each night instead of studying the play book, he cannot expect to do well in the games. The same idea holds true for Christians. If our minds are conformed to this world, how can we expect to prove what the will of God is in our daily living?

Consequently, Colossians 3:1-2 directs that we keep seeking the things above, and set our minds on such things. After all, that is where Christ is! If we focus on man's interests, we run the risk of distorting God's will. Jesus emphasized this thought to Peter in Matthew 16: 21-23.

Philippians 4: 8 provides further guidance regarding those matters which we should think about. We should let our minds dwell on (i.e., seriously consider) what ever is honorable, right, pure, lovely, of good repute, excellent and praiseworthy. This standard is broad and includes many things. For example, we are to seek God's kingdom and righteousness over food, clothing and drinks. See Matthew 6: 31-34. And we should fix our hope on grace, and

not the lusts of the flesh. See 1 Peter 1: 13-16. Of course, the Bible is full of other wonderful examples.

When focusing on the things above, we must also realize the importance of doing so. Romans 8: 5-8 provides the consequences that result from our thoughts. Namely, "the mind set on the flesh is death, but the mind set on the Spirit is life and peace." (NASB)

In conclusion, then, just as a car can be filled with unleaded or leaded gasoline, our Christian minds can be filled with unholy or holy fuel. If we make the wrong choice by choosing the unholy, we may falter and stall during those times when we have the best opportunities to prove our love for Jesus Christ, through our words and our actions. If we choose the holy, though, we will be better able to serve God according to His will, whatever the circumstances.

another, but they instead made an impression to the world around them. Christ put a more personal touch to this concept by instructing, *"Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."* -Matt. 5: 16-

Today's society pushes individuals to push beyond the basics and search common practices for newly found philosophies. Regrettably, I often find myself applying this idea to the pulpit, and, even worse, to my conversation with non-believers. Any person off the street is not going to be converted by a discussion of angels and demons.

It's time that we, as Christians, take the reins like our forefathers and accept the full responsibility of being the "called of God." We were saved because some one took the time to tell us about Christ. *"Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved."* -Acts 4:12- We must make our presence known. According to *2 Peter 3: 9*, God wants "everyone" to be saved. We, as sons of God, must adopt this concern for the unsaved, and earnestly try to beckon them back to Christ. The only way to do this is to teach them "about" Christ and salvation. Anything less is a falling short of our duties as Christians.

In my opening citation of *Matt. 28: 19, 20*, I left off the final word "A-men". I left it off because by stating, "a-men" we agree to follow that Great Commission and preach the gospel. My challenge to you, and to myself, is to stand up, accept our responsibility, and pursue the basics of preaching the gospel of Christ.
